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FOREWORD: REFLECTING ON A YEAR OF IMPACT AND PROGRESS

As I reflect on the journey of Afrikindness throughout 2022–2023, the urgency and relevance of our mission have never been more palpable. The profound impact of lack of empathy, increase in racial bullying, discrimination, and harassment on the mental health of young people, and the consequential fragmentation of families is only beginning to reveal its depth.

We hear of parents facing the dilemma of shielding their children from the harsh realities of racial bias in the UK, while parenting under the shadow of fear. The negative experiences taking an increased psychological and emotional toll on our young ones, call for a collective response to break this cycle of distress.

In the 2020–21 academic year, the alarming surge in racially motivated bullying (pdf link), with 1,198 reported instances in Scottish schools alone, marked the highest figures on record. The statistics tell a stark tale—a 20% rise in incidents over four years and a staggering 60,177 racist incidents recorded in UK schools over five years. The urgency to address this issue became even more evident in 2023 with a racially aggravated assault on a Black pupil in Ashford, Surrey, emphasizing the prevalence of racist bullying in our schools and the involvement of adults in some cases.

A debate pack on racial discrimination in schools by the House of Commons Library stated:



In October 2020, a report from the YMCA² (link to PDF) looked at young Black people's experiences of racism. The outcome included that: –

- 95% of young Black people report that they have heard and witnessed the use of racist language at school.
- 49% of young Black people felt that racism was the biggest barrier to attaining success in school, while 50% said the biggest barrier was teachers' wrong perceptions of them e.g., being seen as "too aggressive."
- 70% of young Black people had felt the need to change their hair to be "more professional" at work or school.

As an organisation, we cannot ignore this harsh reality. It raises some critical questions about the impact of racism on children and their sense of identity and belonging. This troubling scenario propelled Afrikindness into a realm of unparalleled activities in 2023.

OUR FOCUS

Guided by the belief that embracing identity is an act of empowerment, we have tirelessly worked to provide children and young people with a platform that promotes kindness in their interactions, celebrates their identity and culture, builds racial harmony, and fosters positive character development. It is only on this basis that we can have an inclusive society where every child thrives.

In 2023, we launched our flagship initiative – Africa Awareness Week, under the CAR-PRIDE³ services for schools during Black History Month. This is a beacon for fostering cultural awareness, diversity, and kindness.

We recognize the damaging stereotypes and misconceptions about Africa. We have endeavoured to challenge these narratives by creating educational content designed by UK teachers that aligns with the UK school

curriculum, building racial knowledge, and promoting inclusivity through extracurricular activities as well. It is also why we produced a short film on one of Africa's most prominent cultural histories — the Benin Kingdom. We are facilitating vital connections with the Arts and Media to co-produce more short films alongside schools to support children's cultural knowledge and appreciation of traditions and diversity.

The impact of our initiatives extends beyond the classroom and homes. Our groundbreaking EMPOWER project program equips children and young people to take charge of community projects, connecting them to their cultural roots and instilling a sense of positive identity. We had 7 children-led projects. One of the projects saw a child in the UK fundraise over £1000 for a feeding project for vulnerable children in his community.

We also had 3 UK children carry out a fundraising campaign which raised over £5000 to renovate a school in a local community. The tangible outcomes, such as fundraising for vulnerable children and renovating schools, underscore the transformative power of kindness and community engagement and, most importantly,

The Empower Project stands as a transformative initiative cultivating positive racial identity in children and young people while honing real-time skills such as empathy and leadership. Fostering a sense of community inspires children to become solution-seekers, instilling the belief that they are integral contributors to the collective progress of their community.

Our K.I.D.S⁴ Academy portrays our commitment to social, emotional, and character development. The program, aligned with CASEL's Framework,⁵ equips students with essential life skills and values, fostering a holistic approach to education that extends beyond academic success.

We launched the 30-day Summer of Kindness challenge and Earth Day competitions, engaging over 500 children and young people in the UK and Africa, which exemplifies our dedication to instilling kindness as a habit. These children's competitions, along with our Kindness Heroes podcast, showcase the positive impact on participants' sense of purpose, gratitude, and happiness.

Our teachers' training workshops and research initiatives underscore our commitment to continuous learning and improvement. Our collaborative approach extends to parents through webinars and podcasts addressing cultural and racial barriers, providing expert insights, and building a thriving parent community with over 2000 members.

The Afrikindness Podcast, inaugurated in May 2023 to coincide with the annual Africa Day, spearheads Afrikindness's mission to dismantle stereotypes and challenge negative narratives about the continent. In alignment with the Organization of African Unity's objectives, the podcast contributes to fostering a more nuanced understanding of pertinent issues surrounding Africa. By popular demand, with 15 episodes streamed over 19 platforms, we have extended our reach to 4 continents (Africa, Europe, North America, and Asia). Securing charitable status with the Charity Commission in 2023 signifies a remarkable milestone for Afrikindness, amplifying our commitment to transparency, accountability, and the ability to access broader avenues of support to further our mission of fostering positive racial identity, kindness and inclusivity.



We are grateful for the support of over 50 volunteers, engagement with over 20 charities and organisations, and the partnerships that allowed us to effect positive changes in the lives of children and families.

As we close the chapter on 2023, it is with gratitude for the organisations, individuals, and our dedicated team who have fuelled our progress. We are proud of the positive outcomes we have achieved, while recognizing the challenges ahead. The coming year beckons us to redouble our efforts in building a more equal and cohesive society. 



- EMPOWER Projects: The EMPOWER projects aim at inspiring and empowering children to connect with their cultural roots. The projects further instil confidence in children to tackle big, real-world problems. It brings a sense of community belonging and autonomy. Young People get involved in a diverse range of community initiatives and projects around the world.

We offer Kindness workshops based on the CASEL framework. We also offer DEI School partnership programs & teachers' training workshops to support teachers' racial knowledge and promote inclusive school environments.

HOW WE DO IT

ADVOCACY & COLLABORATIVE APPROACH

- **Parent Community Group:** This group provides support and information to parents, especially parents migrating to the UK. We host webinars and community engagements organised in collaboration with professionals, teachers and parents to help tackle the issues relating to race, other sensitive topics around race and discrimination as well as the mental health and wellbeing of children. We provide support to parents, empowering them with the right tools, information, and expert views to support their parenting journey.
- Research: Our research focuses on promoting children's mental wellbeing and improving the understanding of issues affecting children of colour their health and psychological wellbeing. Our 4 key priorities include: positive racial identity development, neurodiversity in children from minority ethnic communities, mental health, and education.



Other areas that align with our priorities include the intersection of race and mental health, accessibility to resources, social prescription, racial profiling and cultural sensitivity and awareness in children and education settings.



AFRIKINDNESS HIGHLIGHTS

January

➤ Our EMPOWER projects, led by children, have grown to encompass <u>seven impactful initiatives</u>, driving community engagement through activities such as fundraising, charity walks, birthday pledges, and bake sales. Through our compelling video series, we share inspiring stories of positive change, highlighting how these projects actively promote social and emotional learning. Our overarching goal is to empower both young people and adults, encouraging their contributions to building safe, healthy, and just communities.

March

- ➤ **Community Group Spotlight:** Afrikindness Research team attended the EMRI⁷ <u>Conference</u> and participated in the world café, discussing the need to promote research on children's mental well-being, neurodiverse children and race-related issues.
- > **Newsletter Publication:** Afrikindness's work with young people was highlighted in the NIHR-EMRI Newsletter for Yorkshire and Humber.
- ➤ **Neurodiversity Week:** In commemoration of the week, a series of <u>videos and parent resources</u> on Neurodiversity with a specific emphasis on black culture were launched, offering educational insights and awareness while guiding parents to the necessary support for navigating the challenges of raising a neurodivergent child. These resources aim to provide valuable information and assistance in fostering understanding and inclusivity within the realm of neurodiversity.

April

Afrikindness' Earth Day Competition, featuring 14 judges and spanning Nigeria and Ghana, received over 600 entries, culminating in six standout winners and 25 commendable entries recognized with consolation prizes. The competition showcased the creative prowess of students committed to environmental causes, fostering a platform for impactful contributions and discussions on sustainability and Earth Day awareness.

May

Africa Day: Launched Afrikindness Podcast during the Africa Day celebration. Africa Day commemorates the founding of the Organisation of African Unity (now known as the African Union). 15 podcast episodes done with a reach of 4 continents.

May/October

➤ Teachers' training workshops: - Gained widespread coverage in all major <u>news media outlets</u>. This accomplishment solidified Afrikindness as a prominent figure in the <u>educational landscape</u> contributing significantly to our overarching goal of bolstering the educational sector.

October

- Africa Awareness Week: During Africa Awareness Week, we unveiled educational resources tailored for schools in the UK, distributing educational content to over 5000 institutions. These materials meticulously covered National Curriculum Statutory Requirements, ensuring alignment with Relationships, Health, and Sex Education (RHSE) guidelines, fostering a deeper understanding and appreciation of Africa's rich cultural diversity.
- > Research outcome: Our Research associate, Dr. Vivian Okoye unveiled key <u>research findings</u> on the challenges Black African Parents face in accessing timely autism diagnosis in the UK.

January – December

▶ Parents Community: The parent team successfully organized 10 impactful webinars featuring experts covering crucial topics like school safeguarding, racial identity, online safety for children, and essential insights on GCSEs and A-levels. With participants spanning four continents— Africa, Europe, North America, and Asia —the global reach of these webinars reflects their widespread impact. Positive feedback and individual support provided to attendees have marked this initiative as a resounding success, fostering knowledge exchange and empowerment across diverse communities.

Afrikindness recognizes that breaking down complexities and barriers is essential, especially when addressing cultural or language hurdles. Through engaging webinars, the initiative highlights cultural intricacies that may impede parents' understanding of key topics.

Solutions and recommendations are provided, resulting in a remarkable 98% of participants gaining a better understanding of the discussed topics, enhancing their knowledge to support their parenting journey and guide their children.

Our range of speakers are carefully selected from key organisations like Place2Be, AFBE-UK, The Diana Awards, Afruca, NHS, Digitallem, Ofqual and Minds Charity.

The impact of Afrikindness extends beyond knowledge enhancement; the community has become a beacon of support for parents in critical situations.

Many have been referred to Afrikindness for guidance, and our initiative has offered advice, made referrals, and signposted to the right sources for additional support.

SCHOOL PROGRAMMES

TACKLING RACIAL BULLYING AND IDENTITY CRISIS: UNYIELDING ACTION IN A TURBULENT YEAR

CAR-PRIDE: Celebrate Culture and Race by fostering Positive Racial Identity Development in Education.

In response to the escalating issue of racially motivated bullying, highlighted in a June 2020 Runnymede Trust report on race and racism in secondary schools, Afrikindness took a proactive stance by launching the Africa Awareness Week campaign. The report identified critical challenges, including a lack of diversity in the teaching workforce, limited representation in school curricula, and low levels of racial literacy among educators.

Afrikindness recognized the imperative to address these issues and consequently initiated Africa Awareness Week. The campaign aimed to equip teachers and schools with the necessary tools to cultivate a more inclusive educational environment. Educational content and research blogs, designed to counter prevailing stereotypes, were disseminated to over 5000 schools in the UK.

The goal was to challenge the prevailing narrative of Africa, often framed by poverty, corruption, conflict, disease, and poor leadership, perpetuating stereotypes, racial bullying, and identity crises among children and young people.

Understanding that racial harmony and identity development require a balanced narrative, Afrikindness facilitated a teachers' training workshop on Racial Identity.

The workshop featured key speakers, including Sardarni Navleen MBE, CEO of Sahara Sisterhood and Community Educator, and Ellen Day, Associate Assistant Head Teacher. The event underscored the importance of using the right narratives to educate children and promote cultural understanding.

We issued certificates to participants for Inclusive Education Training, enhancing their skills and fostering a more inclusive educational environment.

Afrikindness firmly believes that cultural learning should be an ongoing journey, not confined to a limited timeframe.







Through our programs, children experienced a transformative journey in positive racial identity development, selecting global and community projects that deepened their cultural roots. The 1–2–1 mentorship sessions and family bonding activities further enhanced their emotional well–being.

Notably, the 30-day Summer of Kindness Challenge, with diverse activities, bolstered their understanding of kindness to oneself, others, the environment, and Africa.

Aligned with our mission pillars, we emphasize building emotional intelligence, social empathy, and environmental awareness in children. The positive racial identity initiatives extend beyond borders, aiming to benefit British African children and youths, promoting pride in their heritage. As we contemplate the impact on education, mental health, and families, it's evident that our efforts contribute to holistic development.

The second vear of our Earth Day competition expanded to Nigeria and Ghana, involving 50 schools, over 500 students, and recognizing 25 winners. This growth showcases the broadening impact of our initiatives, emphasizing the enduring importance of fostering kindness, positive racial identity, and environmental consciousness in the lives of voung individuals and communities alike. Winners of the competition received enticing prizes. including cash awards, mentoring, a creative writing workshop sponsored by Tebeba Publishing, and a three-month art workshop sponsored by Orede Art Academy.

The film's success propels us to forge collaborations with media firms and schools, aiming to continue inspiring young minds with the next series on the Benin Kingdom.





EMPOWERING MINDS: UNVEILING INSIGHTS AND FOSTERING INCLUSION IN MENTAL HEALTH AND NEURODIVERSITY THROUGH RESEARCH INITIATIVES.

In the past year, our research endeavours have seen notable achievements, beginning with our participation in the EMRI conference. Afrikindness actively participated in the EMRI Conference, engaging with representatives from community groups, EMRI Group members, EMRI Hub Leads, CRN Yorkshire and Humber Research Champions, and the CRN Yorkshire and Humber Agile Research Team. The conference served as a platform to celebrate and showcase the remarkable work accomplished over the past year, emphasizing the importance of raising awareness and encouraging research participation in under-represented communities across the region. During the event, Afrikindness seized the opportunity to connect with strategic organizations, participating in the World Cafe and fostering collaborative efforts for greater impact in promoting diversity and inclusivity in research initiatives.

Dr. Vivian Okoye's <u>research on autism disparities</u> in black communities offers invaluable insights, enriching the discourse on addressing neurodiversity imbalances. Her work provides a nuanced understanding of the unique challenges faced by individuals, highlighting disparities and paving the way for targeted interventions and support tailored to the specific needs of black individuals within the autism spectrum.

The dissemination of informative blogs to the public has expanded our reach, and our research team's round table discussion on the intersection of racial identity and mental health for World Health Day has sparked engaging dialogues among researchers and mental health specialists.





The impact of these initiatives is evident in the enriched understanding of autism disparities, increased public awareness through disseminated blogs, and the elevated discourse surrounding the connection between racial identity and mental health.
